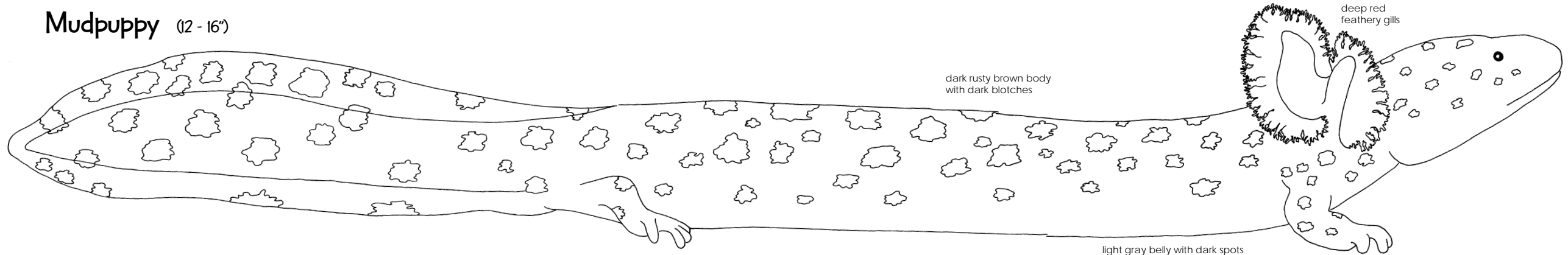
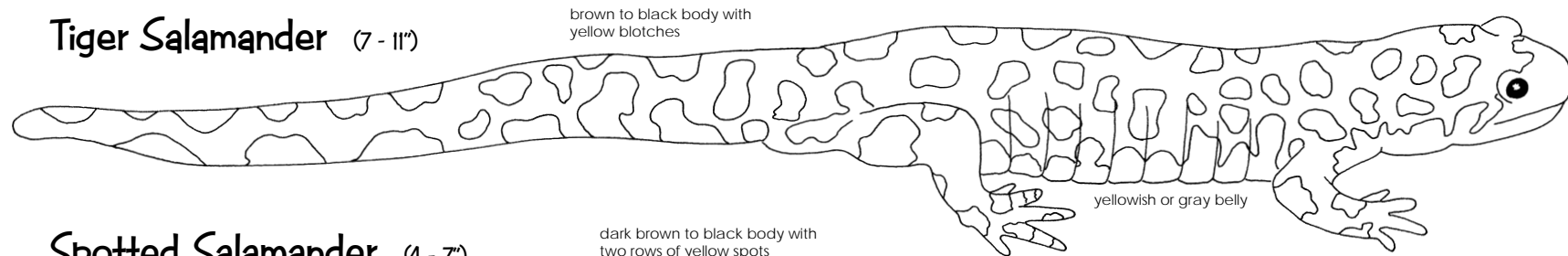


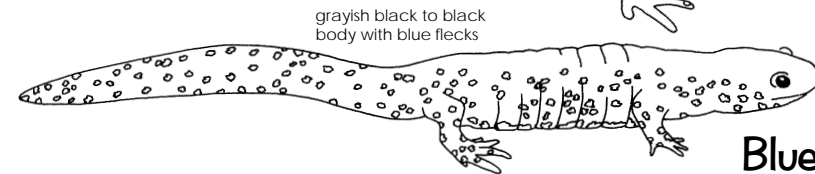
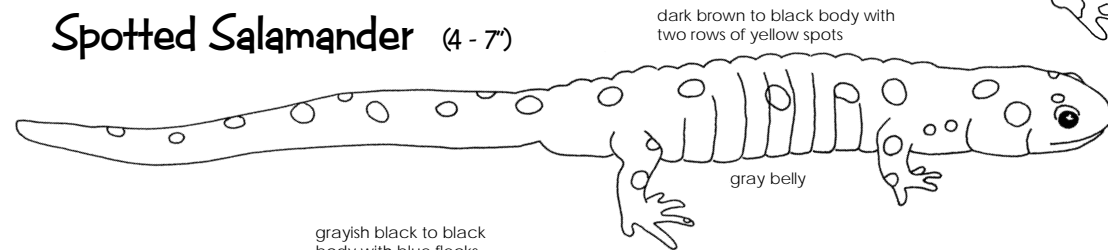
Mudpuppy (12 - 16")



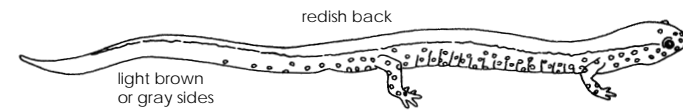
Tiger Salamander (7 - 11")



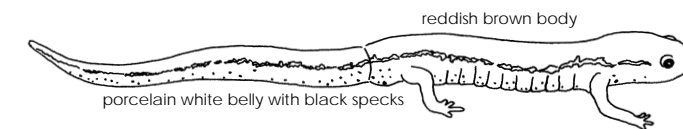
Spotted Salamander (4 - 7")



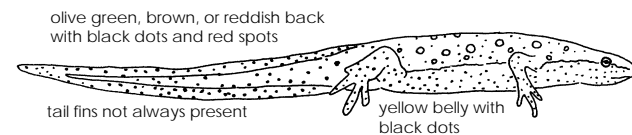
Blue-spotted Salamander (3 - 5")
